NYC Parks Announces \$75 Million In Mayoral Funding For Ongoing Reconstruction Of East River Esplanade Projects

On Saturday, February 22, NYC Parks Commissioner Mitchell J. Silver joined by Congresswoman

Side and East Harlem - to announce that Mayor Bill de Blasio has allocated additional funding, \$75 million, to further East River Esplanade reconstruction projects spanning from East Midtown through East Harlem. ESNA was represented by President Barry Schneider and Vice President Judy Schneider.

"Thanks to Mayor de Blasio's continued commitment to addressing waterfront needs, we are able to continue the extensive work of bringing our beloved East River Esplanade into a state of good repair," said **Commissioner Silver**.

number of issues of general
concern – traffic enforcement,
illegal electric bikes, errant bike
riders flouting the rules of the

Queensboro Oval Tennis Now Accepting NYC Tennis Permits for Summer Season and Beyond.

ESNA members may recall that back in the spring of 2016, the association urged the city to return the Queensboro Oval - York Avenue at E. 59 – E. 60th Street, - to the public as a year-round public park. Unfortunately, that was not to be. The city has issued a 10-year lease for the entire Oval to Sutton East Tennis.

But wait - there is a Silver lining to the story. Thanks to the efforts of NYC Parks Commission, Mitchell Silver, the Sutton East Tennis is now much more community friendly. From now until September 15, 6 courts will be reserved for NYC Parks Tennis Permit holders. Plus, there will be free and/or low-cost public programming, and 2 courts will be



reserved for the Licensee's feebased programs. In addition, there will be free Senior Citizen Clinics and Cardio Tennis, Pee Wee Programs and Junior Development Programs. For more information, contact Sutton East Tennis at



Pedestrian Alert! Traffic Changes at Second Avenue and the Queensboro Bridge May Pose Challenges to Local Residents.

When the NYC Department of Transportation added a



dedicated bike lane on the east side of 2nd Avenue, they also changed how

foot traffic moves north and south at that location. After decades of requiring pedestrians to traverse that intersection on the west side of 2nd Avenue, pedestrians can now cross directly in front of the traffic coming off the bridge at the traffic light. In the last couple of weeks, the the Crime Prevention Offices of the 19th NYPD Precinct have been on the scene to alert motorists, bikers and pedestrians of the new configuration. A word to the wise: Be especially mindful of the cars coming off the bridge – be sure they have come to a full stop at the light before you cross the street. ESNA wishes you well!


NYC Transit to Challenge Mighty Mollusk with Lexington Ave Bus Lane Enhancements



Beginning this summer, the MTA will begin implementation of a plan to modify Lexington Avenue to improve service. This fall/winter 2019 will be the post implementation and data monitoring

period. The goal: Beat the snail at its own game - by moving the bus lane away from the curb. Currently bus

thousands of daily bus riders, enable loading during peak period along the west curb, improve curb access for local businesses by updating regulations and have minimal impact on traffic flow. The proposed curb regulations updates: to add commercial metering to improve curb access and reduce double parking to the existing regulations which are generally metered parking 10 am – 7 pm on west curb and 7 am – 7 pm on east curb. Good News for Parks Enthusiasts

24 Sycamores Park, at York Avenue and East 61st Street, will get getting a face lift in coming months. Included in the project are be the reconstruction of the comfort station with ADA accessible ladies and men's rooms. After several

delays, construction is expected to start this November. The work will take about approximately 18 months. The area will be regraded, the asphalt pavement removed and new pavers installed. The



base of the flagpole will have some limited repairs. New fencing will be installed around the swings. The paint will be removed from the comfort station and the natural brick color will be restored. The architects for the current project are Jorge Prado and Carolina Charles. The last renovation to the park was over 20 years ago. We want to thank our former Councilmember, Jessica Lappin, for providing the funding for this much needed facelift.

BE A PARTNER - BE INVOLVED!

Partnership and involvement make a vibrant community. That was the message at ESNA's 28th




annual meeting. As New York
State Senator Liz Krueger put it –
ESNA's eyes, ears and voice form
the most valuable partnership that
an elected official can have. It is
that type of relationship that gives
understanding and focus to the
issues that matter to
neighborhoods. That view was
echoed by Assembly- member
Rebecca

Seawright when she talked about coming up with programs to assist residents – legal clinics, screenings, shred-a-thons, senior summits and voting forums. Hearing the concerns of the community was also a theme of Assemblymember Dan Quart when he talked about the critical need for action in Albany on property taxes and transportation issues. The high property taxes, he said, represent a major contributor



to the vast number of empty stores on the Upper East Side.

"Greening" also requires partnership, according to Manhattan Parks Commissioner William Castro. The



Commissioner called Barry and Judy Schneider partners in the efforts to create and enhance park space in the East 60's.
Councilmember Ben Kallos took up the green issue highlighting ESNA's involvement in the esplanade and the Andrew Haswell Green park programs. The councilman also talked about a senior program at the newly

surfaced Sutton Tennis Club. Among others in attendance at the meeting was Ben Jacobs representing Councilmember Keith Powers.

After Captain William Gallagher, Executive Officer of the 19th Precinct, happily advised the group that the

bank robber of 1st and 2nd avenue banks had been caught, Barry said that one of the ways to be involved in crime prevention was to attend the Monday meetings of 19th Precinct Community Council. Barry thanked the Captain



for always being available and introduced Officer Luis Ouezada and Officer John Papa as officers who are also always available to the community. Being involved also means patronizing the shops of local merchants who are an essential part of the community. The information from restaurants, banks, cultural institutions and vendors displayed at the Merchants Table served to promote that aim as Barry thanked Dunkin Donuts and Bed Bath and Beyond for providing meeting refreshments and the Colonial Dames of America/Mount Vernon Hotel Museum for all of their help in setting up for the annual meeting. During the required segment of the annual meeting, financial results for the fiscal year were announced and Joan Ferrone and Judy Schneider were reelected as directors of ESNA. Barry gave the annual report of the president and mentioned that there would be a special event in February to highlight and promote ESNA's local merchants. He also gave the dates for ESNA's Winter Clothing Drive, Saturday, November 9, and its annual Toy Drive/Holiday Sing, Monday, December 9, a fun and meaningful way to "be involved". While not an ESNA event. Barry reminded everyone that on November 5, election day, there would be five New York City Charter Revision proposals on the back of the ballot that should not be skipped.

Sarah Malaika of the U. S. Census Bureau presented the "You Count! Be Counted!" feature of the meeting. She explained that the Bureau conducts about 130 programs, but the most important one is the census taken every ten years as mandated by the U. S.


Constitution. The census forms the basis for how approximately \$657 billion of federal government funds

get allocated to state and local agencies funding hospitals, schools, parks, transportation and other vital services. It also forms the basis for how many members are allocated to each state for the U. S. House of Representatives. The aim of the census is to count where 330 million people in 140

million households reside as of April 1, 2020. Full details are available at https://2020census.gov/, In thanking Sarah for this valuable information, Barry stated that everyone should participate and tell others that they must answer this most important census questionnaire in order to be involved in assuring that not only New York State and New York City but the ESNA community as well receive their fair share of federal resources.

Following Sarah's presentation, Barry gave an overview of LinkNYC - those kiosks that are on certain sidewalks on the avenues. He explained how the

equipment can be used -- for 24/7 emergency support with a 911 button; for free phone calls; for free Wi-Fi Internet access; for getting information about the weather, public service announcements, maps, directions: and even for charging devices. Barry then turned to ESNA's annual construction project review using the coded map (included with this newsletter), which has become the mainstay of each annual meeting. He advised great caution should be used in at the new pedestrian and bike crossing on the east side of 2nd Avenue at the
